Trinity has revised and updated its Integrated Skills in English (ISE) qualification. The exam is available at five levels from A2 to C2 on the Common European Framework (CEFR), so there is a level for every learner.

ISE is a four skills qualification intended for young people and adults - typically at school, college or university. It is also suitable for teachers who require a respected English language qualification. ISE assesses students' ability to interact in English in an authentic and meaningful way through the use of integrated reading and writing tasks and integrated speaking and listening tasks. Preparing for ISE builds real-life English skills and transferable skills required for academic study and employability.

Learning to learn: self-knowledge, motivation and emotions Aránzazu García Burgos

Emotions are highly connected to learning, but especially with self-knowledge and motivation. We will try to discover the importance of these three points through our own experience, considering the way we learn and thinking about an experiment we are going to do with music and cooking.

As far as have to think about their own way of doing things, it will become easier to rethink and get conclusions about the three main points of learning to learn in children. Emotions can only be felt inside, and that is why own experience becomes so important in this topic

She thinks learning comes from personal experience, and that is highly connected with emotions in many ways.
